CENTENNIAL RENDEZVOUS STAFF GUIDELINES AND
INFORMATION

Purpose of the event:

- 1 To fulfill the Aims of scouting
 - A. Participate in Citizenship
 - B. Moral strength and Character development
 - C. Develop Physical, Mental and Emotional Strength
2. Celebrate the Centennial of Scouting
3. Have SAFE FUN

How will we accomplish these goals?

1. Ideals --Everyone will be asked to live the Scout Law, the Scout Oath , Slogan and Motto
Adults will set the example and hold boys accountable to do the same.
2. Patrols --- The boys participate in Patrols with a Patrol Leader. This gives youth leaders opportunities to grow. Give these young leaders room to do what they need to do to be leaders only interfering when a safety issue or abuse is involved. Remember they learn from mistakes as well as successes.
3. The outdoors --- Our activities are held outdoors for a number of reasons:
 - A. Gain an appreciation for nature and to be conservation minded
 - B. Fresh air and exercise
 - C. Get away from electronic gadgetry and interact with others
 - D. Learn to survive without all of our modern conveniences
4. Advancement --- The boys will be working on advancement requirements in their campsites and at some activities. Advancement helps the boys to develop self-reliance, overcome challenges, and to help others.

5. Adult Association ---- These kids live in a world that is often segregated by age and need to develop skills interacting with others of different ages. Many of our youth live in single parent homes and often lack male role models. Live a good example.

6. Personal Growth --- Comes from doing good turns, service project and earning religious emblems. Don't be afraid to ask the boys for help when setting up, tearing down, cleaning up, or any other odd jobs needing done. Please give safety instruction if needed.

7. Leadership Development --- Practice citizenship. If a patrol leader is struggling you might make suggestions to him then let him make the decision.

8. Uniforms --- During ceremonies Scouts are expected to wear their class A uniforms. Compliment those who look sharp and ask about their badges etc. so they will be proud of their uniforms and what they stand for.

Activity Guidelines --- A number of different types of activities will be going on, including the following: Historical re-enactments, teaching trapper rendezvous skills , Scouting skills, competitions, nature study, trapping instruction, Native American dancing and other skills. Because of the nature of the different activities we ask that Activity Leaders be aware of Safety concerns in your area and those adjoining your area. Teach safety first. If Scouts ignore safety rules, ask them to leave and not come back, get their names and troop numbers so we can take actions if needed. Because of the large numbers of boys, they may be asked to go to a program area once if there are boys standing in line who have not done it yet. We hope everyone gets an opportunity to take part. There will be Scout Leaders assigned to be over the different program areas (for example all Black Powder).

In the event of an accident the activity area is to be closed until the emergency is over . There will be a medical tent near the flag pole.

Staff Camping and Set Up:

If you plan to camp in a RV, you will probably be in the parking area outside the main camp. If you are in a tepee or tent, you will be in the main camp. The boys should be arriving at camp throughout the afternoon of Aug 5. Rendezvous events will not begin until 9 AM Friday morning. Some of the events will be taking place across the river from the camp and will not be accessible by vehicle. If you have a lot of stuff that needs to cross the river, please allow time for that. We plan to have a walk bridge but it will probably not be usable until about noon on Aug5. The river should be about knee deep at that time of year if you choose to ford it. Once the boys start showing up you may enlist them to help move gear.

Personal conduct:

No smoking or drinking alcohol in camp.

Keep language clean and positive.
